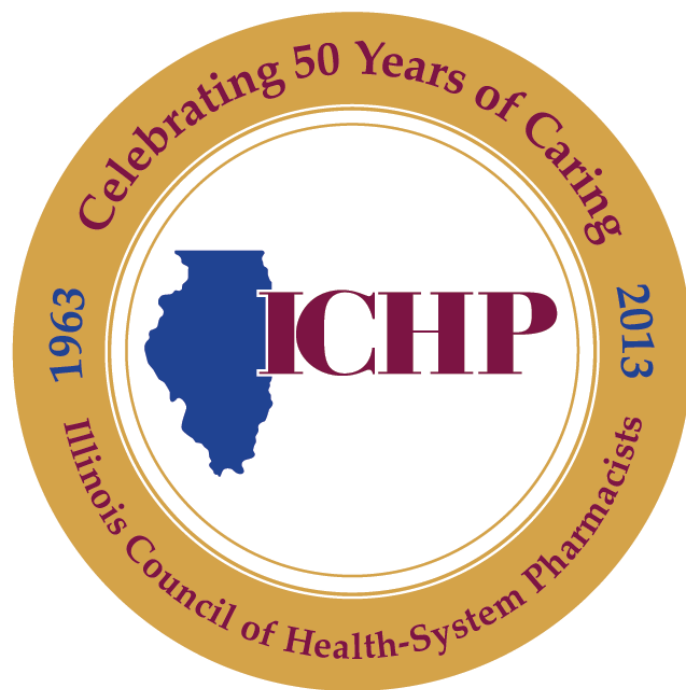

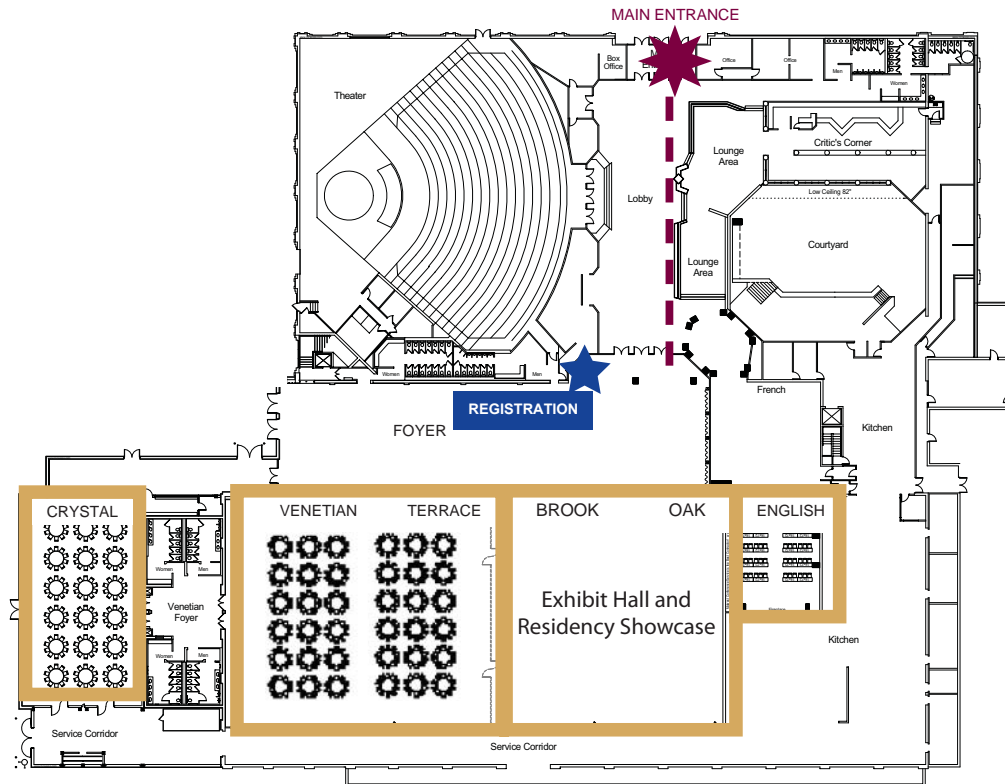
Drury Lane Conference Center Map

Keynote Speakers



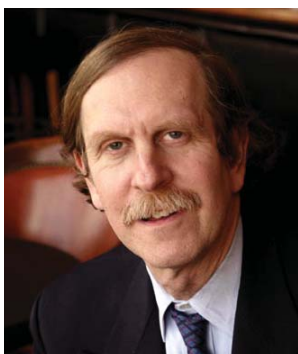
James Jorgenson, RPh, MS, FASHP is Chief Operating Officer at Visante and will be giving advice on how to engage the C-Suite and other key stakeholders in the importance of pharmacy services, particularly with the new pharmacy practice model concepts. Visante is a health care consulting company founded by a pharmacist to assist clients in the areas of hospital & health-system services as well as managed care part D services. Consultants of the firm are health leaders with advanced training and expertise. Jim's more than 30-year career has included pharmacy oversight of some very large health systems and their network associations as well as academic leadership in graduate pharmacy education. He is credited with more than 60 articles in the professional literature and is a sought-after speaker, having given more than 190 presentations to groups in the US, Sweden, Australia, Japan, Spain, Canada, and the

United Kingdom. Jim's leadership has also extended to numerous professional organizations. He is a member of the ASHP Foundation Pharmacy Leadership Academy and was given the 2008 ASHP Award for Distinguished Leadership in Health-Systems Pharmacy Practice.



Eric Kastango, MBA, RPh, FASHP is President of Clinical IQ LLC, a health care consulting firm with expertise in the area of USP Chapter <797>, aseptic processing (pharmacy and pharmaceutical based), medical device manufacturing, and the implementation of quality systems. Since 1980, he has practiced pharmacy in a number of practice settings (including hospitals, community, and home care) in a number of different of roles, including the Corporate Vice President of Pharmacy Services for Coram. Eric has also managed a FDA-registered cGMP manufacturing operation for Baxter. He is an active member and Fellow of the American Society of Healthcare Pharmacists and has served on the ASHP Council of Education Affairs. He has also served on the USP Council of Experts, Compounding Expert Committee and was chairman of the USP Chapter <797> subcommittee. Eric has over 150 invited national and inter-

national professional presentations on a variety of pharmacy practice topics such as sterile product preparation, pharmacy compounding errors, and quality systems. Eric will be speaking on the topic of Sterile Compounding.



Gordon Schiff, MD is a general internist who joined the Brigham and Women's Hospital's Division of General Internal Medicine and Primary Care in 2007 as a clinician researcher in the area of patient safety and medical informatics and Associate Director of the Brigham Center for Patient Safety Research and Practice. He is Associate Professor of Medicine at Harvard Medical School. He worked at Chicago's Cook County Hospital for more than 3 decades where he directed the General Medicine Clinic and Chaired the institution's Quality Assurance/Quality Improvement, and P&T (Formulary) Committees, and was Professor of Medicine at Rush Medical College. Currently he is the Clinical and Research Director of the 3-year AHRQ-funded Massachusetts statewide malpractice and patient safety improvement initiative—the PROMISES project (Proactive Reduction in Outpatient Malpractice: Improving Safety Efficiency

and Satisfaction). Dr. Schiff was the Medical Director of the Center for Research in Therapeutics CERT TOP-MED project (Tools for Optimizing Prescribing, Monitoring and Education related to medication usage) based at University of Illinois College of Pharmacy in Chicago, and is currently a lead investigator in the Brigham and Women's Hospital AHRQ funded Health Information Technology Center for Education and Research in Therapeutics (HIT-CERT). He was awarded a grant by the National Patient Safety Foundation (NPSF) to study 100,000 CPOE-related medication errors reported to the USP MEDMARX. He is a past Chair of USP's Consumer Interest panel that oversaw the Consumer Reports' drug information for patients book. He is a co-investigator in a Commonwealth Fund sponsored evaluation of an innovative primary care medical home project in Massachusetts and New York. Dr. Schiff will be presenting on principles of conservative prescribing.

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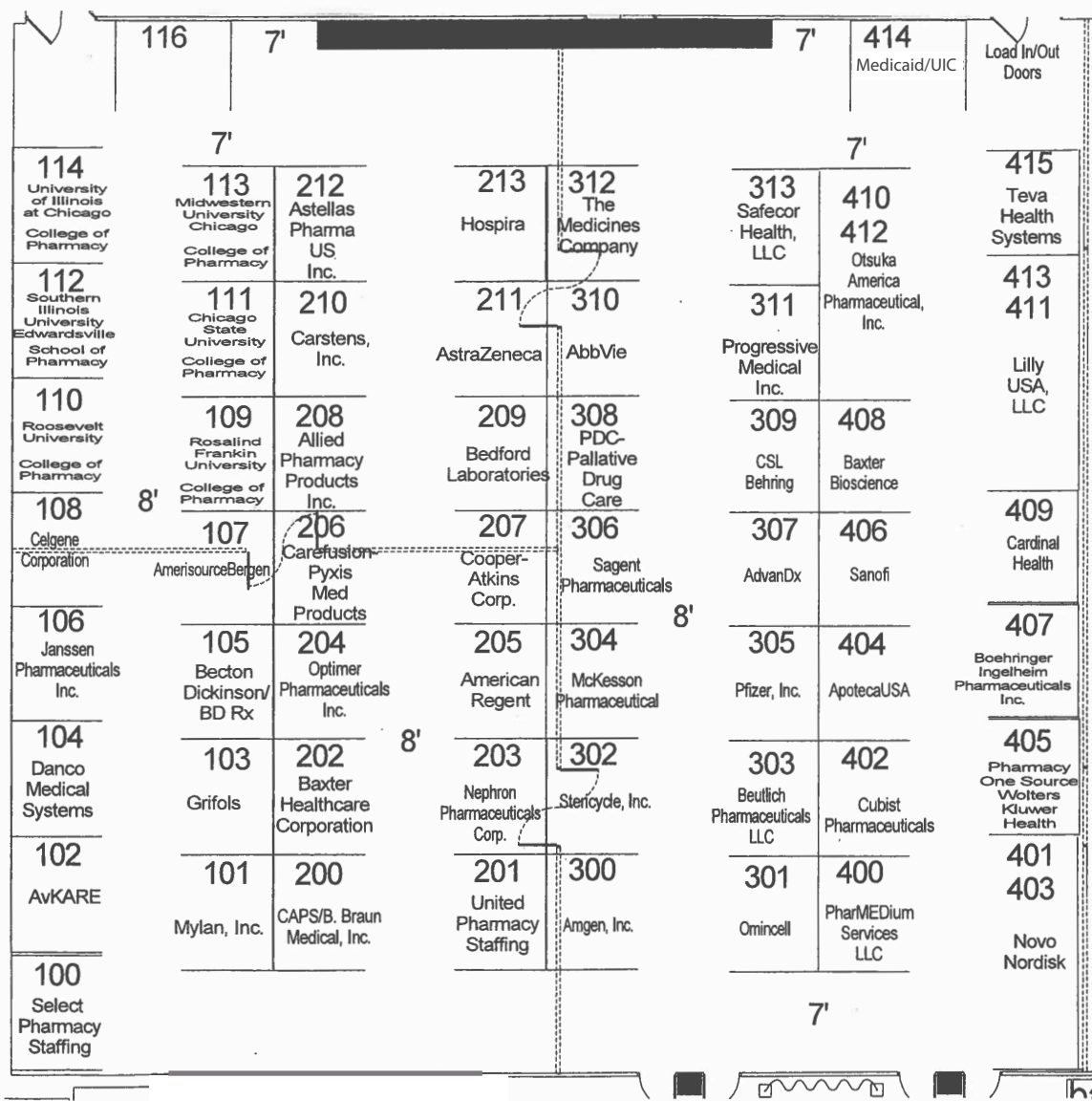

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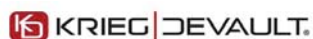
